Making a splash

It started with a fish.

More accurately, it started with two little girls – the rosy-cheeked daughters of Covington artist Robert Post – and his desire to make them smile.

And so, after years of specializing in hyper-realistic wildlife artwork, he decided to swim in a different direction and sketch out a whimsical and colorful cartoon fish. And then another.

And another and another and another.

Flash-forward a couple of decades, give or take, and nine original undersea sculptures by Post – now employed by a certain animation house in Orlando, Florida (yes, that one) – have found a home at St. Tammany Health System's Covington hospital, where since late August they've been greeting visitors and warming hearts as part of St. Tammany Hospital Foundation's Healing Arts Initiative.

You'll also see them "swimming" through the pages of this annual report. Think of them as our spirit animals for 2022.

"I can't put into words how thankful I am that something that would have for the next 15 or 20 years be laying on the pages of a sketchbook ... can be shared with a lot of people now," Post said in August, standing amid the vibrantly colored, ceiling-mounted aquatic menagerie.

No sooner were the sculptures installed in late August than they began drawing "oohs" and "aahs" from pint-size visitors to the hospital, according to Nicole Suhre of St. Tammany Hospital Foundation.

"We've incorporated a lot of different kinds of art into the hospital over the years, from our first piece – a player piano for our lobby – to paintings and drawings and sculptures of all descriptions," Suhre said. "Robert's incredible, vibrant pieces really add something special. The whole goal of the Healing Arts Initiative is to harness the power of art and give people a respite from real-world issues, even if for a moment. Robert's sculptures certainly do that, and I have a feeling they're going to make a splash with our patients."

Eventually, Suhre said, the plan is to have the fish migrate down Highway 21 to a permanent home in a new facility currently being designed for St. Tammany Pediatrics, the health system's primary care kid clinic that was displaced by 2021's Hurricane Ida.

"All I can hope for," Post said of his work, "is that it brings some smiles to some faces."



Living with COVID-19

After two years of lockdowns, masking and social distancing, 2022 will likely be remembered as the year COVID-19 first transitioned from pandemic to endemic — or a disease we've learned how to live with, like the flu.

That doesn't mean it's no longer dangerous, particularly for older patients and those with diabetes, high-blood pressure and other such conditions. There were only three days in all of 2022 in which we didn't have at least one COVID inpatient at our flagship St. Tammany Parish Hospital. On average, we had 17.43 COVID-19 inpatients every day throughout the year.

But between vaccines and the temporary immunity that comes with being infected with COVID, we're no longer in fear of the virus overwhelming our national healthcare infrastructure. Additionally, our team of doctors and nurses now know so much more about what was initially a fairly mysterious disease.


So, while there's always a chance another variant might crop up and cause trouble, St. Tammany Health System stands ready — as it always has — to protect and care for our community.

Multiple births aren't out of the ordinary at St. Tammany Health System. Since its flagship St. Tammany Parish Hospital first opened its doors in December 1954, more than 60,000 babies have been born there. In the process, its New Family Center has become the destination of choice for parents-to-be on the Northshore.

But on Sept. 12, 2022, there was even more "awwww" than our maternity nurses had seen in a while. Not just one set of twins, and not just two sets of twins but three sets — a half-dozen individual bundles of joy – were all discharged from the hospital's Neonatal Intensive Care Unit on the same day.


Making it all that much more special was the fact that it landed smack dab in the middle of NICU Awareness Month.

The year brought our NICU team two more good reasons to celebrate. In June, it officially became a breast milk donor depot, accepting milk from approved donors of the Mother's Milk Bank of Louisiana – and saving them a trip across the lake to donate.

Closer to the end of the year, a full renovation of the NICU was finally completed — in plenty of time to welcome the next 60,000 babies.

A community united

With its Be Well Bus leading the charge, St. Tammany Health System once more teamed with the St. Tammany Parish Sheriff's Office in 2022 to rally the community around the annual observance of October as Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

The bus, a 40-foot mobile health unit equipped with high-tech 3D mammography equipment, rolled with dozens of screening events throughout the month as part of St. Tammany Hospital Foundation's United in Pink initiative. In addition, the Sheriff's Office invited members of the community to pitch in by paying \$5 a pop to sign a pink-wrapped sheriff's vehicle.

By the time the month was out, some 88 women had received mammograms on the bus, and the Sheriff's Office had raised \$17,240 for local cancer care.

And that's just one month. For the rest of the year,

the bus crisscrossed the community, providing a variety of health screenings, vaccines and community education week in and week out.

It's only been in service a relatively short time, but the bus has proved so effective as a community health tool — reaching double the number of people in 2022 that we had hoped to reach — that U.S. Rep. Steve Scalise in March announced he had secured \$1 million in federal funding to support the health system's mobile screening program.

"We're so grateful to Rep. Scalise for his encouragement and guidance in our efforts to create a healthier Northshore," STHS President and CEO Joan Coffman said. "Our Be Well Bus screening unit literally carries health and wellness into our service district, and we recognize this appropriation will enable its healing work substantially."

Throughout all of 2022, more than 1,000 patients, a record, took the preventative step of getting a lung scan — which is simple, brief and pain-free — at STHS.



In December, staffers at St. Tammany Cancer Center – A campus of Ochsner Medical Center, distributed holiday food boxes — containing everything necessary for a full, healthy meal — to eligible patients. By the time the three-day drive-through event was done, some 90 happy families had passed through.

Giving back

Families are there for each other. That's just how it works. And that's no different for the St. Tammany Health System family.

As is the case every year, health system colleagues joined with a variety of local groups for a wide range of give-back events to support the community that has supported us for nearly 70 years.

That included the annual holiday food-box distributions for patients at St. Tammany Cancer Center – A campus of Ochsner Medical Center. It also included visits from Santa Claus and the Easter Bunny for those same patients' families. And that's just the tip of the proverbial iceberg.

In April 2022, a group of STHS doctors, nurses and administrators were among the 40 volunteers pitching in to install a community garden on the Safe Haven behavioral health campus in Mandeville. In August, St. Tammany Hospital Foundation's employee pledge drive saw 765 health system employees donate a total of \$104,380 to support STHS's healing mission.

And in December, the health system's Adopta-Family Christmas drive raised enough from colleagues to fulfill the holiday wishes of 39 local families this year, including more than 100 children.

That's a whole lot of giving back — and a whole lot of love, from our St. Tammany Health System family to yours.





The message is clear: You appreciate St. Tammany's brand of compassionate care, and we have no intention of changing that.







If you were looking for a single representative symbol of the nine-year-strong relationship between St. Tammany Health System and Ochsner Health, you need look no further than St. Tammany Cancer Center – A campus of Ochsner Medical Center.

Opened in mid-2021 at the corner of Interstate 12 and Highway 21, the 75,000-square-foot gamechanger celebrated its first full year of operation in 2022, bringing together doctors, nurses and other medical professionals from both organizations. With this combined expertise all under one roof, the multidisciplinary facility is the area's only true one-stop-shop for cancer care.

But while it's the conspicuous symbol of the St. Tammany/Ochsner relationship, it is by no means the only one.

Since entering a strategic partnership in 2014 for the stated purpose of improving our community's health and quality of life, the two organizations have joined hands to improve the level of and access to care in any number of specialties.

There's the pediatric inpatient unit at St. Tammany Parish Hospital. There's Ochsner Neurosciences Institute at St. Tammany Health System. There's the joint St. Tammany/Ochsner Transcatheter Aortic Valve Replacement team.

The list goes on - and on and on.

In the process, the bonds between the two organizations have only strengthened and, as a result, so has the health of the Northshore community they serve.

Healthier Northshore



Two years ago, local leaders founded the Healthier Northshore coalition to plant the seeds for improved population health metrics across St. Tammany and Washington parishes. In 2022, with key leadership from St. Tammany Health System and its Community Outreach program, those efforts began bearing fruit.

And vegetables.

In April, volunteers with the community-based Healthier Northshore – which was started by more than 50 of the Northshore's leaders in the healthcare, government and nonprofit sectors – pulled on their garden gloves to plant a community garden at the Safe Haven behavioral health campus in Mandeville.

Then, in October – after giving the garden a little time to grow – the group followed up by teaming with the American Heart Association

to host a free cooking demonstration in which Chef Dave Solazzo of Del Porto Ristorante in Covington showed a standing-room-only crowd exactly what to do with the harvest.

It was the first of what is envisioned as a series of free cooking demonstrations from local chefs designed to promote healthier food choices by incorporating fresh vegetables from local gardens.

It's also perfectly aligned with the group's overall mission of addressing behavioral health, smoking/ vaping cessation, nutrition and exercise, as well as increasing community screening opportunities.

"Nutrition and access to healthy food choices are the hallmarks of Healthier Northshore," said Anne Pablovich of St. Tammany Health System. "At the same time, Chef Dave is known for his use of fresh, local vegetables. So, this cooking demo is really a match made in culinary heaven."

The spirit of 'coopetition'



A nationwide concern since the start of the COVID pandemic, and one that reaches across all industries: too many job openings and not enough qualified candidates to fill them.

In May 2022, St. Tammany Health System decided to do something about it, partnering with other local healthcare, education and economic stakeholders for Northshore Healthscape, a three-year strategy pilot program dreamed up by St. Tammany Corporation – the parish's economic development arm – to promote the Northshore as a healthcare destination and bolster the local healthcare workforce.

"We are grateful to St. Tammany Corporation for gathering the leading health systems on the Northshore into this pilot program," St. Tammany Health System President and CEO Joan Coffman said. "Rather than competition, we lead with 'coopetition,' because we are cooperatively focused on strengthening our labor pool and elevating our region as a destination for world-class healthcare."

In addition to St. Tammany Health System and St. Tammany Corporation, key stakeholders in the program include Ochsner Northshore-Mississippi Gulf Coast Region, Slidell Memorial Hospital, Our Lady of the Lake and North Oaks Health System, as well as representatives of St. Tammany, Tangipahoa and Washington parishes.

Building for the future

Crows in that some species have been observed using what appear to be tools. That includes the veined octopus of Indonesia, which is known to clean and carry coconut shells for use as shelter.

There's something to be said about standing the test of time. After all, there's a reason Band-Aids and tongue depressors have changed so little over the years. It's because they do what they were designed to do, and they do it well. But at St. Tammany Health System, we like to keep our eyes focused forward, on the road ahead, watching for innovative tools and methods to help us best serve our community. That includes such attention-getting things like our ever-expanding fleet of robotic surgical assistants, but it also includes exploring new ways to leverage existing technology for our patients' benefit and convenience. That dedication to innovation is a key reason we've been able to deliver on our promise of bringing world-class healthcare close to home for the Northshore — and it's a reason we're poised to continue to deliver it tomorrow and the day after that and the day after that ...

A tradition of innovation

In 2007, St. Tammany Health System established the first robotics institute on the I-12 corridor when it introduced robotic-assisted surgery to the Northshore. Since then, the health system has only continued to grow its robotics arsenal.

That includes the purchase of multiple da Vinci robotic assistants, which specialize in aiding surgeons during pelvic surgeries. It includes Stryker's Mako system, which aids in knee replacements. It includes Synaptive Medical's Modus V microscope with BrightMatter technology for neurosurgery.

And in 2022, two innovative new systems joined the fleet.

In March, the health system announced the purchase of the leading-edge ExcelsiusGPS system, elevating the level of neurosurgery expertise available close to home for Northshore residents.

Then in October, Dr. Mark Hontas – an orthopedic surgeon with St. Tammany Health System's Bone

and Joint Clinic – became the first in South Louisiana to conduct Velys robotic-assisted knee replacement, an innovative, second-generation procedure designed to get patients back on

their feet sooner, with less discomfort and more mobility.

It's the latest in what has become a tradition of innovation at St. Tammany Health System, as it works to live up to its promise to deliver world-class healthcare close to home for residents of the Northshore.

Dr Mark Hontas "St. Tammany Health System

has committed to embracing new technology to help us provide the best healthcare we can, and that's true across the board," Dr. Hontas said. "It's a very exciting time to be a part of St. Tammany Health System."

Advancing neuro care

In a major advancement of neurological care on the Northshore, Ochsner Neurosciences Institute at St. Tammany Health System in 2022 expanded its footprint and its capabilities at the health system's hospital campus in Covington.

The groundbreaking expansion allows for many patients with complex brain conditions who would have previously been transferred to a hospital outside the region to remain on the Northshore for the duration of their treatment.

Among other things, the expansion increased the number of dedicated beds in the hospital's neurology unit from eight to 10, with room to expand to 14, and the number of beds in its Neuro Intensive Care Unit from six to 10.

In addition to a wealth of advanced technology in its operating rooms, the neuro care team also now includes a round-theclock neuro-specific ICU physician and a dedicated neurosciences physical therapist.

Taken together, the moves allow for 24-hour neuro-focused intensive care at the hospital.

"Previously, we would have had our neurosurgeons perform surgery and then transfer the patient to Ochsner on the south shore," said Corey Olson, director of the neurosciences program at St. Tammany Health System. "Now, we can perform these complex surgeries, and then the patients are being transferred down the hall

to the neuro ICU and staying with us, here, close to home, for the extent of their care.

"So, we're really caring for the patient now from start to finish. They can get top-notch neuro treatment here – and stay on the Northshore."

Leading the way

St. Tammany Health System has long been dedicated to bringing the most innovative care possible to Northshore patients, and, true to form. . 2022 saw it notch a number of notable "firsts."

That includes Dr. Mark Hontas' pioneering use of the Velys robotic-assistant for knee replacements. (See p. 19) But also, in February, it was announced that STHS had become the first in Louisiana to offer Body Vision Medical's C-Arm Based Tomography, highly advanced diagnostic technology that produces intraoperative CT imaging for earlier and more accurate lung cancer diagnosis.

"It enables us to visualize and pursue lesions such as ground glass opacities and other challenging lesions that without this technology are some of the hardest cancers to diagnose," STHS pulmonologist Dr. Ricardo Blanco said.

Then, in October, the health system's heart valve

replacement team - which in 2019 became the first on the Northshore to offer the game-changing, minimally invasive TAVR procedure – became the first in Louisiana to successfully implant in a patient the newest Edwards SAPIEN 3 Ultra RESILIA valve.

This groundbreaking valve, which is the only dry storage transcatheter heart valve currently on the U.S. market, was engineered with anticalcification technology to address one of the primary causes of reintervention following heart valve replacement, according to Edwards.

It's also another display of the spirit of teamwork and innovation on which the St. Tammany Health System Structural Heart Program prides itself, according to Program Coordinator Karolina Ruthner, NP.

"This shows the tremendous difference we make in patient care, always offering the latest technology for best outcomes," Ruthner said.

The team approach

Not all innovations involve technology. Sometimes, it's about the personal touch.

In August, after two and a half years of COVID-19, doctors and nurses at St. Tammany Health System's flagship St. Tammany Parish Hospital returned to Structured Interdisciplinary Bedside Rounding - or SIBR rounding - which is the fancy name for a process in which an inpatient's entire care team visits them in their room daily to discuss and coordinate their care.

This includes their doctor. It includes their nurse. It includes a case management professional, a representative from the hospital's pharmacy and a social worker. And it results in greater efficiency and communication among hospital colleagues.

The goal is to get everyone, including the patient, on the same page quickly and easily. The result, said hospitalist Dr. Robert Oubre, is better care for the patient and boosted confidence in their care plan and their care team.

"This new way of structuring bedside rounds ultimately benefits the patient," Dr. Oubre said. "It benefits the care team as well, but even those benefits ultimately benefit the patient. That's a win-win, as far as I'm concerned."

Going virtual

Some people call it a "virtual nurse." Others might describe it as a "remote nurse."

St. Tammany Health System Director of Telemetry Medicine Mathilde Lyon has a different way of seeing the newest nursing position at the health system's flagship St. Tammany Parish Hospital.

"It's like having a guardian angel," Lyon said. "That's the best way to look at it. It's like having an extra set of eyes watching over you, caring for you, while you're in the hospital."

Whatever you call it, the innovative virtual nursing

program at STHS grew out of the early days of the COVID-19 pandemic, as hospitals around the world tried to figure out new ways to conduct routine caregiving tasks - monitoring vital signs, answering

patient questions, conducting pain assessments, discussing medications and the like – without needlessly exposing nursing staff to the virus.

This gave the nursing team an idea: What if they assigned an experienced, veteran nurse to staff an on-site computer station that would allow him or her to drop in virtually on patients - almost like a Zoom call – and conduct those routine tasks?

"The idea isn't to replace caregivers at the bedside," Lyon said. "It's to enhance that care, helping with work that needs to be done to free up caregivers to focus on providing the type of quality bedside care St. Tammany is known for. These nurses will be able to keep our patients safer. It's a second check."

The idea quickly gained steam, and a pilot program was launched in early September on the hospital's 33-bed Telemetry Medicine unit, with plans to scale it up and expand it from there.

It wasn't the only example in 2022 of the

health system leveraging existing technology to expand care. In October, STHS expanded its digital health offerings – and expanded access to healthcare for local residents - with the introduction of Virtual Care Now, a healthcare innovation in which patients can schedule same-day virtual visits with a healthcare provider dedicated

solely to conducting such electronic visits.

Designed with patient convenience in mind, Virtual Care Now provides patients 5 years and older with access to a healthcare provider from their smartphone, tablet or computer to address most acute conditions, depression/anxiety follow-ups and patients in need of a referral.

EXPANSION



Fun Fact: A single sea turtle can leave a truly expansive footprint. One mama leatherback will lay four to eight times a season, producing as many as 110 eggs at a time. Those turtle tykes that survive

to adulthood will end up swimming as many as 10,000 miles a year and can dive 4,000 feet.

In December 1958, just four years after it first opened its doors, St. Tammany Health System's flagship St. Tammany Parish Hospital cut the ribbon on its first expansion, a new \$75,000 wing adding 14 beds that boosted inpatient capacity by nearly 50%. Over the next seven decades, as the population of the Northshore exploded, expansion would become a common theme for the hospital. In fact, neither has yet to abate, with more and more people discovering the allure of the Northshore — and with St. Tammany Health System, as a result, currently in the midst of its longest sustained period of growth in its history. In fact, we've become pretty good at this expansion thing. That's good, because local population growth shows no signs of slowing. And we are ready, willing and able to grow along with it.

BREAKING GROUND

On Nov. 2, 2022, St. Tammany Health System leaders broke ground on the Northshore's newest healthcare facility, a \$75 million same-day surgical center adjacent to the existing Paul D. Cordes Outpatient Pavilion on Bootlegger Road south of Covington.

The 126,000-square-foot building, which when complete will boast 12 surgical suites and an array of support services, is expected to be complete and ready for patients by late summer 2024.

"Today, we're simply turning dirt," St. Tammany Health System President and CEO Joan Coffman said. "But when our construction team is finished on this state-of-the-art facility, it will stand as another fulfillment of our promise to deliver world-class healthcare close to home for residents of west St. Tammany Parish. We take that promise seriously."

Announced in October 2021, the new surgery center will mark the fulfillment of a strategic goal of the health system as recent advancements in technology and recruitment of highly skilled specialists have increased the volume of surgeries that can be accomplished in a 23-hour stay.

Clinical capabilities planned for the center

and scope of the project are being developed according to national best practices for high reliability, efficiency and safety for patients, STHS team members, visitors and vendors.

"In 1954, we were founded as St. Tammany Parish Hospital," STHS Chief Nursing Officer Kerry Milton said. "During the dedication ceremony for that first building, Police Jury President Fred Mizell – speaking to hospital board Chairman Oliver Hebert – said, 'In turning over to you the keys to this institution, Mr. Hebert, I say: May you never lock from your door one who needs your help.' I am pleased to say we've honored those words over the past 68 years."

The stable of services offered by St. Tammany Health System gained a notable addition in Folsom in summer 2022, as the health system's Outpatient Therapy and Wellness Department opened a new rehab clinic on the New Heights Therapeutic Riding Center campus.

With the move, patients throughout the area now have an opportunity to share in the benefits of hippotherapy, a fancy medical term – derived from the Greek "hippos," meaning horse – for therapeutic horseback riding.

In addition to hippotherapy sessions, conducted by a trained STHS hippotherapist using New Heights' horses and riding facility, the new Folsom clinic offers a full suite of traditional physical therapy, speech therapy and occupational therapy offerings.

"The horses are, of course, what sets this location apart from our other clinics," said Mike McNeil, director of outpatient rehab services for St. Tammany Health System. "But I'm just as excited that this new location is going to provide full-service, clinic-based rehab therapies — both for adults and for children — even closer to home for people living north of Covington."

St. Tammany Health System's cardiovascular practice – one of the oldest and most respected heart and vascular clinics in western St. Tammany Parish – ended 2022 with a new name, a number of new faces and the addition of a new clinic for the convenience

of Mandeville patients.

Formerly known as Covington Cardiovascular Care, the practice has been rebranded STHS Cardiovascular Clinic, a reflection of its expansion beyond Covington and into Mandeville.

In addition to the new clinic. the practice has added two new care providers to its team: cardiologists Dr. Stefan Sicinschi and Dr.

Hafiz Ghafoor. They follow the addition in June of Dr. George Isa to the practice, which also includes Dr. Georges Antoun, Dr. Bekir Melek, Dr. Russell Reed, Dr. Paul Stahls; and nurse practitioners Sarah Bourgeois, Nicole Sesser and Mary Scheyd.

With the changes, Dr. Stahls -a member of the practice since 2013 – has expanded his focus on electrophysiology, a specialty that, among other

St. Tammany Health System, founded in 1954 as St. Tammany Parish Hospital, employs nearly 2,700 people, making it the second-largest employer in St. Tammany Parish.

To be considered for the Best Workplaces recognition, companies had to have a facility in the New Orleans area, have at least 10 employees working in the eligible areas, and be in business a minimum of one year.

Companies from across New Orleans entered the two-part survey process to determine the Best Places to Work in New Orleans. The first part consisted of evaluating each nominated company's workplace policies, practices, philosophy, systems and demographics. This part of the process was worth approximately 25% of the total evaluation.

The second part consisted of an employee survey to measure the employee experience. This part of the process was worth approximately 75% of the total evaluation. The combined scores determined the top companies and the final rankings.

'COMFORTING STITCHES'

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, the frontline caregivers at St. Tammany Health System and other healthcare organizations had their communities covered. In late 2022, Vizient teamed with QUILTmania magazine and the Georgia-

based Chattahoochee Evening Stars Quilt Guild to return the favor in their own special way.

On Nov. 1, Vizient Southern States President and CEO Bill Senneff paid a visit to St. Tammany Health System's flagship St. Tammany Parish Hospital to present the organization with a unique, handmade expression of gratitude: an approximately 5-footsquare quilt handcrafted by an international team of quilters and embedded with healthcare imagery.

"QUILTmania wanted

to do something to recognize caregiving during the pandemic," Senneff said. "So they came to us with the idea of quilting."

In all, 80 quilt designers answered the call, with another 1,000 quilters from around the world joining in to help stitch 10-inch blocks that would be assembled to form 18 quilts. In September, the final products were displayed as part of an exhibition at City Hall in Alpharetta, Georgia, before being distributed to specially chosen healthcare organizations.

The quilt presented to St. Tammany Health System, appropriately, incorporated deep red

> tones – matching the health system's signature color – and included quilted blocks made by quilters in California, Texas, Illinois and Mexico.

In many cases, the quilters who worked on the individual blocks signed their names, all of which are included in a panel stitched to the quilt's reverse explaining the sentiments behind the project, dubbed "Comforting Stitches: Quilters' Response to the Pandemic."

Their only requests, Senneff said, was that the quilt be displayed in a place where members of the caregiving team

at St. Tammany Health System can see it, as a reminder that their dedication during the pandemic has been recognized, and also that members of the public will be able to view it to remind them of those sacrifices.

The quilt has since been framed and placed on view on the third floor of the hospital, right outside its New Family Center.

'THE PIANO MAN'

Fred Booker goes by a lot of titles.

Some call him Dad. Some call him Coach. Some call him Lt. Booker.

But to visitors at St. Tammany Health System, he's "the Piano Man," a sobriquet the security officer earned for his habit of spontaneously stopping to tickle the ivories of the mini-grand piano in the lobby of the health system's Covington hospital.

"It always gets a positive response. It seems to make people happy," Lt. Booker said. "If they don't need me on a post or on a unit, I'll go play for 10 minutes or so. Sometimes, I'll walk past the front desk and they'll say, 'Go play us something,' and so I play them something. It's relaxing. It's a stress reliever."

Visitors to St. Tammany Health System clearly felt that as they arrived at the hospital one afternoon in spring 2022.

As he noodled on the keyboard, Lt. Booker got at least two thumbs-ups from passersby, along with innumerable smiles and a playful exchange with a hospital colleague pretending to look for a tip jar. Another colleague described Lt. Booker as "St. Tammany Health System personified."

In May, Lt. Booker caught the eye of

WDSU-TV's Heath Allen, who put together a feature story on him to share with the entire New Orleans metro area.

Despite his innate musical talent – which he suspects may have come from his grandfather, who played upright bass as part of a church choir – playing professionally was never in the cards. After graduating from high school and two years at Southeastern Louisiana University, he joined the Army, then segued into a 33-year career with the Hammond Fire Department.

When he wasn't working, he coached youth sports for more than 28 years.

In 2011, he retired from the Fire Department but quickly realized retirement wasn't for him. "I was going nuts," he said – which brought him and his musical talents to St. Tammany Health System.

That longtime dedication to serving others earned Lt. Booker the city of Hammond's Wilbert H. Dangerfield Award for his years of service to the community.

"That was huge," he said, pausing from the piano. "When you're doing these things, you're not doing it for recognition. You do it out of love."

BUILDING FOR THE FUTURE

Seventeen St. Tammany Health System employees received a total of \$30,000 in scholarships in 2022 from the St. Tammany Hospital Guild and the health system's Medical Staff Committee.

That included a record seven recipients of the Medical Staff's spring awards – five more than usual – in a nod to the challenges faced by healthcare workers since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic. Each was worth \$2,000.

"We had so many outstanding candidates. Their stories were so compelling," STHS Chief Medical Officer Dr. Patrick Torcson said, explaining the reasoning behind expanding the field of recipients. "We felt rather than narrow it down to two, we'd open it up this semester."

The Med Staff also awarded two additional scholarships, also worth \$2,000, in the fall.

The guild, an all-volunteer organization that raises money for the hospital through various means – including the operation of the hospital's gift shop – awarded eight 2022 scholarships to health system employees pursuing education to further their medical careers. Each of the guild scholarships is worth \$1,500.

St. Tammany Parish Hospital Service District No. 1 - better known as St. Tammany Health System - is governed by an eight-member Board of Commissioners, six appointed by the St. Tammany Parish Council to six-year staggered terms, one elected by the medical staff to a one-year term and one nonvoting member, the parish president or designee.



We are deeply proud to recognize the 1,400 individuals, STHS colleagues, businesses, organizations and foundations who made contributions totaling \$972,774 in 2022. The generosity of these supporters has brought contributions in support of the healing work of our health system to over the \$22,588,000 mark raised since our inception.

Gifts from the generous donors in our community enabled the foundation to grant an unprecedented \$958,061 to St. Tammany Health System in 2022, funding equipment, education and training opportunities, department programs, health system initiatives and more. An artful impact

St. Tammany Hospital Foundation has for years been shining a spotlight on local artists through its Healing Arts Initiative, but in 2022 it found itself in the spotlight.

On Oct. 20, the St. Tammany Commission on Cultural Affairs recognized the program, naming St. Tammany Hospital Foundation's Healing Arts Initiative the 2022 recipient of the commission's President's Award.

Presented as part of the commission's 16th President's Art Awards, which annually celebrate artistic achievements on the Northshore, the honor recognizes the foundation's continued efforts to incorporate the work of local artists as part of its larger support of the healing mission of the care providers at St. Tammany Health System.

"It is an honor beyond words to see our Healing Arts Initiative recognized in this way," said St. Tammany Hospital Foundation Executive Director Nicole Suhre. "The foundation is proud to be the steward of this nationally recognized initiative through the hard work and dedication of our Healing Arts committee. Additionally, we are deeply proud to have donors who are passionate

about making the inclusion of arts in healthcare a standard at St. Tammany Health System."

Suhre was on-hand to accept the award on behalf of the foundation, along with St. Tammany Health System President and CEO Joan Coffman and foundation Trustee and Healing Arts Committee Chair Mary Lee.

The Healing Arts Initiative was started in 2004 with donations made by St. Tammany Parish Hospital employees for the purchase of a player piano for the hospital lobby, aquariums for the hospital's Pediatric Unit and Paul D. Cordes Outpatient Pavilion, "Healing Ceiling tiles" in MRI and CT rooms, as well as a restful south Louisiana landscape mural in the Radiology Department.

Since then, the initiative has grown to encompass a wide-ranging collection of works created by local visual artists – from paintings to sculptures to photographs and more – that are on display at St. Tammany Health System facilities across western St. Tammany Parish, as well as the inclusion of architectural elements and music therapy that all work together to create a healing environment for patients, guests, and staff.

St. Tammany United

In 2021 St. Tammany Hospital Foundation began its foray into formal awareness campaigns for select initiatives, first with its autism awareness campaign in April and then with its United in Pink campaign in October. In partnership with numerous departments at St. Tammany Health System, our combined efforts to unify our community through the healthcare initiatives important to them has been hugely successful. The second annual autism awareness and United in Pink campaigns in 2022 joined the foundation and the health system with corporate partners, local schools and organizations, the St. Tammany Parish Sheriff's Office and individual donors to raise money for STHS's efforts to care for those with autism, as well as our efforts to educate the community on the importance of early detection of cancer through screenings. The community is who shines in these campaigns. Their consistent, enthusiastic and generous support is why these campaigns grow bigger and more impactful each year.

Gifts that made a difference

Chances are you already know, but it bears reiterating: The Northshore is a great place to live for innumerable reasons. There's the peace, the quiet, the family-friendly atmosphere, the natural beauty. But we're also always moved by the community's unflagging generosity. Here are a few snapshots from 2022 worth celebrating:

- **GRANTS:** No patient should have to forgo treatment due to transportation obstacles. In this spirit, the American Cancer Society made a \$10,000 grant to the Transportation Assistance Program at St. Tammany Cancer Center A campus of Ochsner Medical Center, to alleviate the financial burden of cancer treatment on patients in need.
- CORPORATIONS FOR COMMUNITY: The foundation was honored to be a recipient of the Shell Giving Pump campaign at select Diaz Shell locations on the Northshore in 2022. This first-time partnership with Diaz Energy was a great success, with proceeds going to benefit pediatric advancements at St. Tammany Health System.
- THE GUILD THAT GIVES: The all-volunteer St. Tammany Hospital Guild made a gift of \$41,000 in support of various projects in 2022, including an Echo Bed for Cardiology, gliders for the NICU, and ongoing support of the Be Well Bus and our integrative oncology programs at the cancer center. This donation brings the guild's cumulative giving to more than \$416,000 since 2003.
- COLLABORATION IS KEY: In 2021, St. Tammany Hospital Foundation and the Northshore Food Bank embarked on an innovative and hugely impactful collaboration with our cancer center through its Therapeutic Food Pantry, which aims to provide essential nutrition to patients who screen for food insecurity while in active treatment. In 2022, 163 patients received 814 food boxes, a nearly 100% increase from the program's first year. From the food staple boxes provided by Northshore Food Bank to the fresh produce, dairy and dietary supplements provided by the cancer center dietitians, this vital program has been fully funded by philanthropic donations since day one.

With a little assistance from Willy Wonka, who helped transform Tchefuncta Country Club into a makeshift chocolate factory, St. Tammany Hospital Foundation and its supporters stepped into a world of pure imagination in October at THE Gala 2022. 


