OUR COVID-19 JOURNEY

Dear friends.

It all started on Friday the 13th. Of course it was Friday the 13th.

It was March 13, 2020, to be exact. That's the day St. Tammany Health System received confirmation of its first inpatient case of COVID-19, the pandemic that shut down most of the world and which, by the end of the year, had taken the lives of more than 375,000 Americans.

And thus began one of the most challenging years in the 65-year history of St. Tammany Health System. Oddly, though, it was in many ways also one of the most rewarding.

It was challenging for the obvious reasons. Long, draining hours were logged by our unflagging healthcare team, as well as by our administrators and everyone else who toils daily to help make their healing work possible. On top of that, there's the fact that – particularly in the early days of the pandemic – precious little was known about COVID-19. That point was brought home in stark clarity to Mandeville resident Mike Bergeron, that first COVID patient whose case was confirmed on March 13.

"I think it might have been (Dr. Richard) Casey came in," Mr. Bergeron remembered. "... He said, 'You're the first patient in St. Tammany (Parish) Hospital to be confirmed with COVID-19. I don't know what that means to you, but to us it means we're going to give you great care and, frankly, we're going to learn together in this process, so work with us.' And it was just inspiring to have someone with that degree of medical expertise be so candid and open."

Mr. Bergeron beat COVID. With help of our healthcare heroes, so have thousands of others. And that's where the rewarding part comes in. As scary and difficult as 2020 was, it was a year that saw the community rise up and make it abundantly clear how much they valued the work being done at St. Tammany Health System. Some donated homemade face coverings or gift cards for our frontline workers. Local restaurants sent over food to feed the troops. Schoolchildren crafted countless handmade cards of support. The St. Tammany Parish Sheriff's Office and Louisiana Air National Guard turned out to give our colleagues in-person salutes.

Honestly, that's what's worth remembering most about 2020: how COVID-19 brought out the best in us, as a community.

We were here for you. You were here for us. And, as dark as it got, we made it through that most challenging year – because, as always, we are much, much stronger together.

Long before COVID-19 upended everything, the World Health Organization had deemed 2020 "The Year of the Nurse." The timing was impeccable. While the pandemic affected every person in every department at St. Tammany Health System, the weary but determined faces of our frontline nurses became the face of the pandemic, as well as the personification of the commitment to the community upon which the health system was founded in 1954. Covington-area resident Ray Lubrano, one of the first COVID-19 inpatients to be admitted to St. Tammany Health System, saw that commitment up close - and he, for one, will never forget it.

DRIVE-THROUGH TESTING

Just six days after St. Tammany Health System diagnosed its first COVID patient, there was already a new hurdle: how to test potentially infected patients without further spreading the disease.

The solution: drive-through testing at STHS Mandeville Diagnostic Center. Concepted and operationalized within 48 hours, the system enabled STHS to gather specimens while patients didn't even have to get out of the car.

The first of its kind on the Northshore, and among the first of its kind in the state, the drive-through embodied the innovation, nimbleness and efficiency that characterized STHS's overall COVID-19 response.

Each day, a line of vehicles would begin to form before the testing center opened. By the time it opened, STHS employees who had been redeployed from other STHS services were on-hand, deftly collecting patient samples in a car-line formation outside the diagnostic center.

Aside from infection prevention, the drive-through also proved convenient, winning praise from the thousands of patients tested. Ultimately, the health system relocated testing to a dedicated facility between the Mandeville and Madisonville primary care locations.

Northshore hospitals team for #MaskUp campaign

Northshore hospital leaders came together to urge residents to mask up in response to the surges in COVID-19 cases.

"Our heroes on the COVID units bring new therapies and save lives each day. Feeling our community upholding them in the fight sustains their resilience, so mask up. It matters," said Joan M. Coffman FACHE, president and CEO of St. Tammany Health System.

"We know it's hard to stay vigilant and wear a mask every day," said Sandy Badinger, chief executive officer of Slidell Memorial Hospital and Ochsner Medical Center – Northshore. "But we also know the science has not changed - masks and social distancing slow the spread of COVID-19."

"While the average person will recover from COVID, your grandmother may not, your aunt may not, your friends may not. We as a health community ask you to be smart, be safe, and mask up," said Hiral Patel, CEO of Lakeview Regional Medical Center.

Hospital leaders decided to band together with this message before the holidays and the risks associated with large gatherings. "As we prepare to celebrate the holidays, we implore each resident and visitor to wear a mask and consider the health of others in everything you do," said John Herman, then chief executive officer of Ochsner Health's Northshore Region.

STHS PLAYS SANTA FOR LOCAL FAMILIES


As part of an ongoing holiday tradition, the health system dropped off two truckloads of wrapped gifts all purchased with money donated by STHS colleagues - to the Department of Children and Family Services in Covington for distribution to local families in need.

STHS Executive Assistant Sarah Gallaher, who spearheaded the effort, said more than three dozen hospital departments stepped up to "adopt" a family for the holidays, filling wish lists provided to them by Family Services.

In an ordinary year, Gallaher said, there's enough participation to brighten the holidays of 25 to 30 families. But this year is anything but ordinary, and participation was off the charts.

It also included a shortage of COVID tests, a crucial first step in bringing any epidemic to heel. That's where our strategic partnership with Ochsner Health, in place since 2014, proved particularly vital in the pandemic's early days. Not only did it provide a valuable conduit of information but also a valuable source of testing capacity — making it an invaluable alliance to our patients and community.

PARTNERSHIP WITH OCHSNER HEALTH

AGAINST ALL ODDS: How talent, teamwork and technology gave one patient a new lease on life

"There's a lot I don't remember," STHS patient Tony Magee said to a Zoom reunion of his St. Tammany and Ochsner care team, "but I'm thankful I'm here now. I'm thankful I'm able to carry on my life."

Magee's story started after he contracted and survived COVID-19, when his doctor detected significant heart valve dysfunction. Having undergone heart valve replacement in 2011, Magee was considered high risk for another.

Rather than traditional open-heart surgery, the decision was made to use transcatheter aortic valve replacement (TAVR), a minimally invasive procedure typically performed in about an hour at St. Tammany Health System, then unique on the Northshore.

As with all TAVR patients, a full battery of diagnostic tests was conducted to identify possible complications, and plans were laid accordingly. Anticipating Magee's coronary artery could become occluded by his old surgical valve, the team inserted a series of wires and balloons as contingency. All those precautions proved prescient when Magee's heart stopped functioning during the procedure.

Thanks to the team's foresight, they were able to re-establish blood flow to Magee's heart quickly. The only problem was that it wasn't enough.

Dr. Gregory Eckholdt, Ochsner cardiothoracic surgeon, placed Magee on a heart-lung bypass machine to maintain the circulation of his blood and oxygen. The surgical and interventional cardiology teams coordinated lifesaving steps, resolving the left side of Magee's heart. A transesophageal echocardiogram, however, showed that the right side was distended.

The team opened up the right coronary, delivered a stent and re-established blood flow in the right coronary.

Ochsner surgeon Dr. Charles Dicorte then took over to remove Magee from the bypass pump. A balloon pump was inserted to support the left side of the heart, and an Abiomed Impella device — another kind of pump — was inserted into the right ventricle, essentially bypassing the function of the heart until it could recover.

From start to finish, the entire procedure took eight hours, which speaks volumes about the dedication and tenacity of STHS and Ochsner teammates.

After about 48 hours, Magee went back into surgery to have the Impella device removed. His heart, having been given enough time to recover, began working on its own.

And that, according to Dr. Eckholdt, is no small thing considering all the challenges that played out – and were ultimately overcome — on that particularly long day in the operating room.

Although Magee's case is an undeniable testament to the talent and training of all of those present, as well as to the value to the community of the partnership between St. Tammany Health System and Ochsner Health, Dr. Eckholdt suggested that maybe something else was at work that day.

"I've been doing this for about 25 years, and I've seen some amazing things, and this ranks in the top three maybe. Maybe one," he said. "It's a real tribute to all the people involved – the preparation, planning and then performance. ... We see some amazing things, and I think it was truly a miracle, and I don't say that lightly."

A NEW HOME FOR **CANCER CARE IN ST. TAMMANY**

As a founding member of the St. Tammany Cancer Center, St. Tammany Health System has long been recognized as a leader in the fight against cancer on the Northshore. And, as 2020 came to a close, its already robust suite of world-class cancer care offerings was growing.

In partnership with our strategic partners at Ochsner Health, St. Tammany Health System's cancer care program – recognized as one of the nation's best by Women's Choice – was preparing to move in summer 2021 into a new, state-of-the-art cancer center building that was well underway near the intersection of Louisiana 21 and Interstate 12 as of Dec. 31, 2020.

In addition to offering one of the most technologically advanced cancer programs in the region, the new \$50 million facility would include 75,000 square feet of purpose-built space, enabling our highly trained team of oncologists, diagnosticians, surgeons and other cancer-care experts to expand even further their dedication to integrated cancer care, treating not just the tumor but the whole body.

For patients, that also means more space, more services, and more timely access to care and local access to advanced services. In other words: more of the kind of support, care and St. Tammany-style compassion they need to transition from cancer patient to cancer survivor.

Three weeks. That's all it took. St. Tammany Health System has long prided itself on the personal touch it provides to patients, but it's also long been an adopter of the newest technology to keep St. Tammany as healthy as possible. So it was only natural when, just three weeks into the COVID pandemic, the health system acquired and deployed a pair of new germ-zapping robots that use pulses of UV light to kill 99% of harmful bacteria. They've since been joined by a small fleet of similar devices, which in turn inspired hospital leadership to add built-in UV lights in the bathroom of every patient room in its new four-story wing. It's all a reflection of the health system's culture of innovation — and St. Tammany is stronger for it.

MEET THE COVID-19 TERMINATORS, STHS'S NEW GERM-KILLING ROBOTS

Yes, R2-D2 and C-3P0 are more famous. So are WALL-E, Gort and even Johnny 5. But they've got nothing on The Twins, the nickname given to a pair of germ-zapping robots deployed in St. Tammany Health System's ongoing fight against the COVID-19 coronavirus.

"Once we found out about the outbreak of COVID-19, we started really focusing on how we could take extra steps to create a safer environment for our patients and staff," STHS Environmental Services Director David Synakiewicz said. "We have been looking at this technology for a year or two years now."

The Twins – formally Solaris Lytbots – don't look like much at first glance. Each is about the size of a large trashcan with an orange-and-white color scheme. It's only once one of them is rolled into place in a patient room - and after Environmental Services housekeepers are done scrubbing the room using traditional chemical cleaners - that the magic happens.

First the room is cleared of people, then the Lytbot's cleaning cycle is activated via remote control from outside the room. At that point, the robot's head flips open to reveal a high-power ultraviolet light disinfecting unit, which rotates 360 degrees while emitting pulses of germ-killing UV light.

"They kill up to 99% of harmful bacteria without chemicals or mercury," Synakiewicz said. "It's a great addition to our process of cleanina."

Synakiewicz and the rest of the health system can thank St. Tammany Hospital Foundation for The Twins. They're the ones who raised money for the robots, along with another quarter of a million dollars' worth of tech gear.

"Even though we're using these for our isolation rooms, they're still going to be used in our regular discharge rooms," Synakiewicz said. "It's not going to be just for isolation. We want to ensure that our hospital is the safest hospital in the parish and the region and the state for our patients and our quests that come in - and for our staff."

LAB CAPABILITIES & IN-HOUSE TESTING

Numbers tell stories, and in the case of St. Tammany Health System, the daily number of COVID-19 patients listed as "patients under investigation" - that is, those suspected of having the novel coronavirus but who are awaiting test results to confirm the diagnosis – tells a doozy.

On April 2, 2020, there were 20 "PUIs," as patients under investigation are known in medical shorthand. A day later, the number was 21. Subsequent days brought similar numbers: April 6 saw 24 PUIs. On April 7, the number was 20.

Then, midway through the month, something notable happened. On April 14, the hospital had only one PUI. Same with April 15 and 16. On April 17 and 18, there were none.

It's not that there were fewer COVID-19 patients coming in, though. Rather, in what is being described as a watershed moment in the fight against coronavirus at St. Tammany Health System, the hospital's lab team had fast-tracked a plan to process COVID tests in-house and thus avoid the 7- to 10-day logjam at already-overtaxed outside labs.


"That," said STHS Director of Emergency Services Bradley Leonhard, "was a game-changer."

Given how contagious the disease is, the hospital's care teams previously had to treat all PUIs as if they were COVID-positive until tests came back. That created a drain on personal protective equipment, to say nothing of manpower and bed space.

With in-house testing, that all changed literally overnight, providing results 45 to 90 minutes after a test was taken. Getting to that point, however, was no small feat.

It required a full-court press from the lab team, which scrambled to order reagents, a key element in processing the collected specimens. They ordered calibration kits. They wrote up standard operating procedures and conducted the necessary training.

They streamlined validation, accomplishing in five days what then-Lab Director Judy Garic said ordinarily takes a month or longer. "It's the biggest game-changer that I've seen in my career," Garic said when asked to put the accomplishment into perspective. "To get this testing in our facility was an unbelievable feat that the lab achieved."

NORTHSHORE ROBOTICS LEADER ADDS MAKO TECHNOLOGY TO ARSENAL

Long established as the first robotics institute along the I-12 corridor, St. Tammany Health System expanded its robotics capabilities in 2020 with the purchase of a Stryker Mako System to perform total knee and total hip replacements.


"By adding Mako to our robotics inventory, St. Tammany changed the way orthopedic surgeries are performed across the joint replacement service line," said STHS Orthopedist Roch Hontas MD. "We're providing each patient with a far more precise surgery plan based on our own decades of experience coupled with the Mako's highly detailed imagery."

Using a virtual 3D model, the Mako System allows surgeons to create each patient's surgical plan pre-operatively before entering the operating room.

During surgery, the surgeon can validate that plan and make any necessary adjustments while guiding the robotic arm to execute that plan.

The Mako Total Knee application is a knee replacement treatment option designed to relieve the pain caused by joint degeneration due to osteoarthritis. Through CT-based 3D modeling of bone anatomy, surgeons can use the Mako System to create a personalized surgical plan and identify the implant size, orientation and alignment based on each patient's unique anatomy.

The Mako System also enables surgeons to virtually modify the surgical plan intraoperatively and assists the surgeon in executing bone resections.

A GPS SYSTEM FOR YOUR PROSTATE?

Your car has a GPS. Your phone has one. Your wristwatch might even have one, as well.

And in 2020, STHS introduced one for your prostate. Kind of.

Doctors at St. Tammany Health System in early 2020 unveiled the organization's new UroNav system, a high-tech blending of MRI imagery with ultrasound-guided images to aid doctors as they biopsy a patient's prostate, helping them more efficiently detect possible cancer earlier.

In a field in which early intervention is crucial, that's no small thing.

"For the first time in medical history, we can look inside the prostate now," said Dr. Joshua Yellin, a radiologist at St. Tammany Health System. "Nothing beats getting to see the architecture of the prostate. That is a direct visualization of a potential problem."

The UroNav process, at its root, is a team effort involving a patient's primary care physician, a radiologist, an ultrasonographer and a urologist.

The whole thing starts with a PSA blood test ordered by a patient's primary care physician. If that test shows an elevated PSA level, which can be suggestive of a prostate problem, MRI images are taken of the patient's prostate and examined by a radiologist.

"We look in great detail not just at the architecture of a lesion, but we look at other factors that we know are associated with cancer. The end result of that is a score (for) each individual spot or question," Dr. Yellin said. "And that's a pretty accurate way of diagnosing prostate cancer just based on imaging alone."

It becomes even more accurate, however, after he turns those images into a threedimensional model

with suspicious areas highlighted. When that 3-D model is combined with the ultrasound, it essentially provides a patient's urologist with a road map to follow – and a specific target to shoot for – when performing a biopsy to confirm a cancer diagnosis, said Dr. Joshua Sleeper, a urologist with St. Tammany Health System.

"When you do (a traditional) biopsy, it's basically random samplings," Dr. Sleeper said. "Now, we do have standard areas where we target, but you're certainly not hitting the entire prostate. And in a lot of men, men who have larger prostates, there's no way to sample that area."

With UroNav technology, Dr. Sleeper said doctors can target suspicious lesions highlighted for biopsy by the radiologist in areas of the prostate not routinely targeted in a standard biopsy.

"With the vast majority of men who have just an elevated PSA, the ultrasound appears normal," Dr. Sleeper said. "We don't see an identifiable region or tumor to hit. The UroNav involves overlying an MRI image, essentially giving us a bull's-eye to hit on the ultrasound image."

The bottom line: fewer biopsies of a single patient and better accuracy – which is good news for patients.

"There's been studies that have validated that it does improve detection and it improves detecting of highergrade cancers," Dr. Sleeper said. "That will certainly play a role in determining treatment options for the patients."

NEW PATIENT WING BEING COMPLETED WITH COVID IN MIND

While there will never be a good time to experience a pandemic, having the COVID-19 pandemic arrive as St. Tammany was building the four-story centerpiece of a \$100 million, threeyear expansion gave us unique opportunities to better arm our system against infectious disease.

The 160,000-square-foot patient tower under construction at throughout 2020 would add 70 private patient rooms to the hospital and incorporate many lessons learned from COVID-19.

The tower features built-in UV light to kill germs, inspired by March 2020 acquisition of Lytbot germ-zapping robots. While those robots, provided through the generosity of St. Tammany Hospital Foundation, continue to work their

magic hospital-wide, the bathroom of every new patient room is equipped with its own built-in UV light.

To address the challenges of communicating with patients who must be kept in isolation – such as, for example, COVID-19 patients – every room is equipped with an iPad so patients can interface with their healthcare providers and with family members without the risk of potential exposure.

That goes hand-in-hand with the hospital's new room design, which is already in use in some parts of the facility.

"With the glass doors in the new rooms, the nurses and the physicians are able to visualize and communicate with the patients without wasting PPE by going into the room unnecessarily," STHS Chief Operating Officer Sharon Toups said. "I think our room design has proven to be extremely successful dealing with COVID, and all of the beds in the new tower will adhere to that new design."

> Given how important negative pressure proved to be in isolating COVID-positive patients, the outbreak also prompted the hospital to reflect on how it can easily convert more beds to negative pressure in the case of a future pandemic.

Similarly, Toups said, a bulk of the new wing's beds were designed to easily convertible for critical care use in the event of a patient surge.

Stronger Together 21



As 2020 dawned, St. Tammany Health System had a major announcement to make: The respiratory experts at Northlake Pulmonary Associates were joining the STHS team. It would prove to be a particularly timely marriage, as they would emerge as some of the superstars of the health system's COVID fight. It would also be the start of another year of sustained growth, pandemic be darned. From continued work on our four-story new patient tower — itself part of a broader \$100 million expansion plan — to the work on the new cancer center we're building near I-12 with our partners at Ochsner Health, St. Tammany Health System kept the throttle down in 2020, fueling a growth trend that shows no sign of letting up soon.

NEW FOUR-STORY PATIENT TOWER TAKES SHAPE

Coordinating the construction of a four-story structure at the same time you're running a full-service hospital is never exactly an easy task. Doing it in the middle of a global pandemic only makes things that much more difficult.

Yet, despite the challenges, work on St. Tammany Health System's new patient wing – ground for which was broken in 2018 and which is part of a three-year, \$100 million

expansion plan – continued in 2020, with a ribbon-cutting ceremony slated for early the next year.

The building, which was designed by the Covington-based fl+WB Architects, blends seamlessly with the existing building. Crews with Womack Construction developed the structure from the ground up, literally, from the dirt to the rooftop.

ST. TAMMANY PEDIATRICS OPENS **NEW FACILITY IN COVINGTON**

It's official: St. Tammany Health System's full-service pediatrics practice has made the move to Covington.

After operating for the past three years out of the health system's Madisonville clinic, St. Tammany Pediatrics opened for business in October in its new location, at 71338 Hwy 21.

"We're a stone's throw from the hospital, which is also a good thing for us, because we're going to be closer to the intensive care units, the pediatrics ICU, the neonatology ICU," said Dr. Robert Fauchaux, chairman of the STHS Pediatrics Department. "So, we're going to be able to be closer to those and have a bigger office, and, because were roomier now, have more services in-house."

All of the pediatricians associated with the practice — Dr. Fauchaux, Dr. Linda Keefer, Dr. Jennifer Miles and Dr. Margie Strong, as well as nurse practitioner Perry Russell – have relocated along with the practice.

The move creates a pediatrics hub for the whole system, co-locating St. Tammany Pediatrics and STHS Pediatric Therapy across the street from Pediatric Orthopedist McCall McDaniel MD in the Bone and Joint Clinic, all a stone's throw from the Pediatric Emergency Room and Level 3 Pediatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU) at

The pediatrics practice is located in the same building as St. Tammany's new Express Care clinic.

In Madisonville, family medicine practitioner Dr. Catherine Pechon set up shop in the space vacated by the pediatrics practice, accepting new patients from age 2 and up.

Williams stressed that the STHS Express Care clinic shouldn't be viewed as an urgent care clinic or an emergency care clinic. It is, however, a convenient clinic.



WOMEN AND CHILDREN'S SERVICES RECOGNIZED FOR IMPROVEMENT IN MATERNAL CARE

Women and Children's Services is always focused on the joy of bringing new life into the world, and the pandemic could not sway the team from their mission. Even as labor and delivery personnel worked to reduce interaction of patients and families to improve infection prevention, they innovated solutions to enable families to celebrate the miracle of birth. In fact, the number of babies born at St. Tammany Health System in 2020 was an all-time high at 2,241 babies, bringing the hospital's 66-year birth total over the 58,000 mark.

STHS is a member of the Louisiana Perinatal Quality Collaborative, a network of Louisiana hospitals aimed at improving perinatal outcomes. The journey to improve maternity care led the team to focus on obstetrical hemorrhage, which is one of the leading causes of maternal morbidity and mortality in not only Louisiana but the United States. This challenge is difficult enough under normal circumstances and was exacerbated by the pandemic.


The journey began in 2019 when the New Family Center and Mother Baby Unit joined the Louisiana Perinatal Quality Collaborative, a support network of hospitals improving maternity care in Louisiana. The ability to work in a partnership gives WCS staff an opportunity to learn ways to promote safer births and overall health outcomes. The team used evidence-based practice research to put best practices into place in 2020, including quarterly hemorrhage drills to ensure staff readiness for these emergent situations, the use of a hemorrhage risk tool to determine those most at risk for a hemorrhage and implementation of quantitative blood loss measurement to accurately count the amount of blood loss during a delivery. The staff weigh all items used during the delivery to determine a weight which correlates with the amount of blood loss by the mother. An obstetric hemorrhage is a high-risk event and accurately knowing the amount of blood loss helps practitioners determine the need for blood replacement. The team's successful work on QBL resulted in being awarded the Improvement Revolution Award during the 2021 LaPQC Perinatal-Neonatal Quality Improvement Conference.





When he arrived at St. Tammany Health System with COVID-19, Wesley Doyle was scared, but he remembers the nurses telling him to trust them. He did — and, in the process, he learned a valuable lesson: As much as anything else, it's the people that make St. Tammany Health System such a special place. "They saved my life," Doyle said. "There's no other way to put it and ... there's nothing I can say to show my appreciation for what they did. They were right. I just had to trust them. They knew what they were doing and they did it."

"Blessings of the hands are always popular," Hospice Chaplain Lonnie Thompson said, "but they're particularly big this year because of COVID and all the stress and strain that's placed on our nurses and doctors."

"We wish to take the time to recognize and thank all of you for the selfless care you provide to the patients and families

of St. Tammany Health System," Hospice Bereavement Coordinator Stephanie Atwood told those gathered for the blessing in the hospital's Cardiology – Medicine unit. "We understand how difficult the days can be, especially with the obstacles we were faced with this past year. NURSING TIME CAPSULE TO PRESERVE THE PRESENT

Fifty years from now, when the nurses of 2070 reflect on the history of their profession, they won't have to work hard to find out what things were like in 2020.

They'll just have to pop open a time capsule prepared by the St. Tammany Health System Nursing Department that is being stashed for safe keeping in a glassed-in enclosure built into the health system's new patient tower.

"We don't know what nursing is going to look like in 50 years," STHS Chief Nursing Officer Kerry Milton said, "but we want to send a message to our future colleagues and we want to remind them to take care of each other. We particularly hope they, too, will be able to give back to this community the way care was provided in 2020."

Although the time capsule includes such COVID-related items as an N95 mask, a face shield and an empty vaccine vial, Milton stressed that it isn't intended to be a memorial to the COVID-19 pandemic.

In fact, the idea was dreamed up long before the coronavirus reared its head, as a way to acknowledge 2020 as the year of the nurse, as designated by the World Health Organization in recognition of the 200th anniversary of the birth of Florence Nightingale.

And so, among the items in the capsule are an STHS nursing residency lapel pin, a copy of the nursing pay scale from 2020, photos and a letter to the nurses of the future penned by Nursing Supervisor LeeAnn Prisk, who was tasked with spearheading the logistics of the project with input from the health system's entire nursing team.

After more than a year of planning, the items were placed in the sealed, stainless-steel capsule – which is really more of a trunk, measuring roughly 2 feet long, 1.5 feet high and 1.5 feet deep. On the top of the box is a plague, visible to visitors, which explains it isn't to be opened until 2070.

In addition to connecting to her future colleagues, Prisk said she hopes as much as anything else that the time capsule serves as a touchstone for the tradition of quality care at St. Tammany Health System.

"I want them to be proud of where they work," Prisk said of her future colleagues. "The quality of care here at St. Tammany Health System in 2020 really is something to be proud of - and I don't see those standards changing."

EVERY DEPARTMENT RISES TO THE OCCASION

Security Department

With longstanding emphasis on safety, the STHS Security team enacted several changes in 2020 to better ensure safety for patients, colleagues and our community amid the COVID pandemic.

At the onset of the pandemic, STHS Security added officers at main campus, Cordes Outpatient Pavilion and Express Care Clinic and staffed the offsite drive-through COVID testing locations and collection sites to facilitate traffic flow and create a welcoming, safe environment.

Security expanded communication to include new ways to contact STHS Security on and offsite, adding more phone numbers and email monitored 24/7 to report events, incidents, concerns, ask security related questions, and request security escorts for visitors and staff.

A combination of evolving CDC guidelines and government mandates to combat the growing pandemic required STHS to remain fluid and apply modified visitation policies throughout the year. These mandates had profound impacts on patients, loved ones, family members and close friends of our patients by limiting visitation. Security, among many other departments, successfully managed this challenge to remain compassionate and understanding during these difficult times.

Environmental Services

The Environmental Services Department addressed a wide variety of challenges brought on by the presence of COVID-19 in St. Tammany Parish throughout 2020.

Manufacturer shortages, logistics hurdles and other interruptions presented challenges for EVS personnel accustomed to particular infection prevention, cleaning and maintenance solutions. Faced with an inability to procure hand sanitizer dispenser refill cartridges, the team determined a way to refill spent cartridges with sanitizer sourced by the gallon. The team worked collaboratively to educate clinical teams about alternative cleaning wipes and which could be used under particular circumstances, innovating to adopt available products rather than waiting for backorders to clear on typical inventory choices.

The team quickly adopted the Lytbot UV cleaning robots (see related story p.17) made possible through the generosity of St. Tammany Hospital Foundation, incorporating their germ-killing power into established infection prevention and cleaning routines.

Security, among many other departments, supported STHS' endeavor to remain compassionate and understanding during these difficult times.

Food and Nutrition Services

The cafeteria team, dietitians, food and nutrition professionals safely adapted to constantly changing conditions from the kitchen and cafeteria to patient rooms, nursing stations and hospital common areas.

One of the biggest challenges for Food Services that also gave the team the greatest joy was coordinating, receiving and delivering the outpouring of food donations from the community. Ensuring food safety, accepting the donations and distributing them to staff presented logistical hurdles never contemplated in the Food Services Department prior to the pandemic. Through the help of St. Tammany Hospital Foundation, the team developed a smooth process to work with generous community members, churches, restaurants and others offering their love and support in the gift of food.

In the hospital, the team adapted room service to patients in isolation to preserve PPE and protect staff while providing high-quality food, provided complimentary guest meals to reduce visitor traffic and increased frequency of sanitation processes above already high standard requirements. The cafeteria expanded hours and increased kitchen staff to provide fresh and hot food throughout a broader portion of the day. They eliminated self-service on the hot line, salad bar and buffet, instead introducing individually packaged grab-and-go and heat-and-eat selections. This was advantageous to night shift and day staff headed home, particularly at a time when grocery and restaurant options were unavailable. The team also introduced a "convenience store" shelf near the cashier to help STHS colleagues unable to find essentials like milk, bread and toilet paper at local stores.

Home Health / Hospice


As teams at STHS facilities adjusted environments, products and routines to respond to the highly contagious COVID-19 virus, Home Health, Palliative and Hospice team members faced a new challenge: how to keep patients, families and staff safe in the field.

Home care teams donned and doffed their personal protective equipment on porches and front stoops. They conducted COVID tests in the community as well as infusion and physician home visits. The department provided daily televisit consults, pulse oximeters and thermometers to Emergency Department patients to enable them to stay home rather than be hospitalized.

Hospice teams developed innovative ways to bring care and comfort, including music therapy. They devised ways for families to "visit" patients in homes and post-acute settings such as nursing homes amid the pandemic. From offering technology for FaceTime to arranging special circumstances, the team enabled family to be at the bedside of a dying loved one.

They knew it was coming. Even before COVID-19 had a name, before it was even a known thing, St. Tammany Health System had long been strategizing for what the future might bring. "I think back to the early days of the pandemic, and we were prepared." That's because, while they're always prepared to handle today, the health system's leadership works hard to prepare for tomorrow and the day after, in so many ways. In 2020, the health system achieved its business goals, focused on patient experience, quality, safety, teamwork, innovation and prudent financial management.









Community backing enabled the foundation to grant \$660,522 to St. Tammany Health System in 2020, funding equipment, team education and training opportunities, department programs, health system initiatives and more. These disbursements allowed for achievements like the Certified Autism Center designation for the inpatient pediatric unit and Pediatric Emergency Department, advancements like breast ultrasound and biopsy equipment and Lymphatouch therapy device, safety measures like medical evacuation equipment for patients in an emergency situation and direct patient support efforts like the transportation program.

Even in a year of uncertainty, the Foundation had much to celebrate including unprecedented in-kind support of local residents and businesses for our disaster relief efforts, the leadership of our STHF Board of Trustees, the work of our volunteers and committees, the unveiling a new Foundation logo and rebranding of our employee campaign to better reflect the unity felt by all colleagues at STHS.

Amid the pandemic, the healthcare heroes of STHS made their commitment to the work of this organization known with 853 employees and physicians raising \$110,869 through the newly monikered "One Heartbeat" Employee Campaign, and a St. Tammany Hospital Guild gift of \$25,000.

The presence of COVID-19 in our community altered our way of life in many ways, especially how we gather. We want to extend our sincere gratitude to the many corporate sponsors, individual donors and community volunteers who turned out to support our signature events that looked very different from past years. THE Gala 2020 took place as a smaller, socially distanced seated dinner and benefited St. Tammany Cancer Center; our first-ever Monster Mash drive-through hosted over 1,000 kids safely from their vehicles in support of the STHS Parenting Center; the Get Lucky! Golf Tournament moved to the fall and benefited Integrative Medicine at STHS; and the first virtual presentation of Angels of Light was produced, which was dedicated to the memory of Richard and Sally Knight and benefited Hospice. Revenue from these special events brought in nearly \$280,000.

St. Tammany Health System is here for us, and it is the Foundation's role to be here for it. We have always believed that Keeping St. Tammany Health System Healthy Keeps Our Community Healthy. Thank you to all who joined us to meet that challenge in 2020.

COMING TOGETHER **THROUGH COVID**

The novel coronavirus pandemic dominated 2020. Early on, St. Tammany Hospital Foundation established a Disaster Relief Fund to provide unrestricted support for St. Tammany Health System during the pandemic. Fueled by significant support from private donors, local businesses and grantors, the fund made an immediate impact.

Sustaining St. Tammany

This initiative began as a way to say "thank you" to healthcare workers and to support struggling businesses by encouraging people to purchase gift cards from local establishments to donate to STHF for distribution to hospital workers.

The Power of In-Kind Giving

The Foundation facilitated over \$70,000 in in-kind donations of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), meals, snacks and treats for our colleagues, gift cards, handmade gifts of support and encouragement and more.

Technology to the Rescue

The challenge of a global pandemic in a healthcare center is often one of addressing safety and sanitization. Existing donor funds were used to purchase two Solaris UV Lytbot cleaning robots (see story on page 17) to complement the hospital's Environmental Services department's efforts to keep patient and caregiver areas germ- and bacteria-free. In addition, members of the STHF Board of Trustees personally funded the purchase of two GermAway cleaning robots for smaller spaces.

Granting Possibilities

Local grantors stepped up to the plate supporting a large spectrum of need. Northshore Community Foundation funded early antibody testing in the community, while Capital One awarded a grant for St. Tammany Cancer Center's Therapeutic Food Pantry, addressing the additional struggles of patients in need during the COVID-19 outbreak. The Louisiana Worker's Compensation Corporation granted \$15,000 for a permanent Recharge Room to address the mental health and well-being of STHS colleagues as they struggle with the demands of caring for the community during a pandemic.

COVID Contributions

Cash gifts of support from local and out-of-town donors contributed to technology and PPE purchases as well as ways to support and encourage our healthcare heroes as they continue to care for the men, women and children in the walls of our hospital.







A GIFT FROM ONE GENERATION TO THE NEXT

In January 2020, the St. Tammany Hospital Guild made a \$25,000 contribution to St. Tammany Hospital Foundation in support of a forensic pediatric program at STHS. In collaboration with the Children's Advocacy Center, training recently took place for specialized education and certification for acute forensic child abuse examinations. Prior to this initiative, families had to travel to the south shore for essential acute examinations following instances of child

abuse. The training empowers St. Tammany Health System physicians, nurse practitioners, physician assistants and S.A.N.E. nurses with the critical skills and expertise to diagnose

and treat acute child abuse cases within St. Tammany Parish. To see this specialized training and certification come to fruition is a huge win for the children in our parish who are in need of these critical resources, here at home. This meaningful and emotional gift brought the guild's total cumulative giving to more than \$356,000 since 2003.

The training empowers St. Tammany Health System physicians, nurse practitioners, physician assistants and S.A.N.E. nurses with the critical skills and expertise to diagnose and treat acute child abuse cases within St. Tammany Parish.

ART THAT HEALS


While many efforts took pause during 2020, one particular group remained active and committed to healing: the Healing Arts Initiative of St. Tammany Hospital Foundation. Encouraged by the positive feedback from colleagues, physicians and patients' family members when artist Bernard Mattox extended his solo exhibition for two months in order to let his artwork encourage and inspire staff, they knew art had its place in helping heal the fatigue of a pandemic. Focused on widespread impact, the committee facilitated

the installation of 42 permanent collection pieces on main campus; commissioned a large-scale installation of original artwork in the expansion of STHS's Women's Pavilion, which also provided essential work for local artists; and kicked off an exciting project that will result in the production of nine oversized sea creature sculptures hanging from the ceiling in St. Tammany Pediatrics' lobby in 2021. Every day the work of this community, supported by donor contributions, proves that #ArtHeals.


